




Fire Apparatus Sales by Month 12 Month Rolling





AFG and SAFER Funding

The funding levels for AFG and SAFER represent a \$10 million increase over FY 2021 levels.

Congress will most-likely have to pass an additional Continuing Resolution (CR) appropriations bill by December 3, 2021, when the current CR ends. This will keep the federal government open and allow the Congress more time to pass the entire set of FY 2022 appropriations bills. However, because both the House and Senate bills contain \$740 million for AFG and SAFER combined, it is highly likely that this number will be in the final FY 2022 Homeland Security Appropriations bill.
